



From Pastor's Pen ...



How long, O LORD, must I call for help, but you do not listen? Or cry out to you, "Violence!" but you do not save? Why do you make me look at injustice? Why do you tolerate wrong? Destruction and violence are before me; there is strife, and conflict abounds. – Habakkuk 1:2-3

Justice God's Way

Read the words of Habakkuk above again. Did God really write these words through Habakkuk 2,500 years ago or was it just last week? The amazing thing about God's Word is the more you read it...it's remarkably contemporary! Right off your favorite internet news feed, the evening news or the newspaper if you still read one. Violence is all around us. And it is disturbing!

When Habakkuk looked out his front window, he saw violence and injustice. The bad guys just did whatever they wanted to. All of Habakkuk's neighbors seemed OK with injustice and violence. As with most things, some people saw an opportunity. They took advantage of evil to advance their own cause without any concern for people getting hurt. Habakkuk could not understand how God allowed all this wrong to happen. Isn't God a just God? Isn't he a loving God? Habakkuk prayed and prayed that the Lord would set things right... but nothing happened.

Does that sound familiar? Today people abuse their authority to take advantage of others. And it is happening in the most respected institutions in our land; in government and the church. But it isn't only there! People disrespect authority to hurt others. People jump to conclusions and ignore facts just to prove their point. No one seems concerned about people getting hurt. Most people just want to win the argument and advance their personal agenda. Maybe you have experienced it. Maybe you're the one who

has been hurt. Maybe you're the one who has hurt others. The question is, why doesn't God punish the evil doers? Why does God tolerate all the destruction and violence we see in this world? Why doesn't He bring an end to conflict and peace to strife-torn hearts?

God answered Habakkuk's prayer by explaining He would bring justice in his own time and way. God told Habakkuk to be patient and trust that God would do the right thing at the right time—which God did.

Do we really want God to bring justice in our time? Think about it. Have you lost your temper? Have you cut people down with your attitude, your words or your actions? Are you really concerned about people who may have been hurt by what you said or did? What are you doing to help relieve the pain of the suffering? You know...if God pays back people what they deserve, why wouldn't He be paying me or you a visit? In the end, do you really want to beg God to bring justice to the world?

Yet Our God already has. On a cross outside of Jerusalem 2,000 years ago, God brought justice to this world. He blasted Jesus with all the punishment deserved by all the violence and evil and wrong committed by the human race. God's Son unjustly suffered in our place. Jesus took that burden because he did not want us condemned. He wanted us forgiven.

On the cross, God's justice collided with God's love. On the cross, God punished all wrong-doers by punishing Jesus. On the cross, God forgave all wrong-doers by punishing Jesus. Looking to Jesus and Jesus alone as our Savior, we can look forward to meeting God without any fear. Because of Jesus, God will welcome us into heaven.

God will also take care of justice here on earth—in his own time and his own way. Sometimes we will have to wait patiently for God to act. Most importantly for us, we know God has already acted to forgive our sin. We never have to fear that he will punish us. Jesus took our place!

Prayer: Gracious Lord, remember not my sins but remember me always as one in need of Your forgiving love for Jesus' sake. Amen.

Minutes: The minutes of the previous church council meeting were reviewed. Motion by Bobbi Marks, seconded by Phil Lewin to approve. Motion carried.

Treasurer: The July treasurers report was reviewed. Motion by Phil Lewin, seconded by Mark Peters to approve. Motion carried.

Pastor: Absent.

Elders: Pastor gave an outlook of events to come this fall. Mavis Kohl is home from the hospital. Tim Lager is hospitalized. Discussed the baptismal banner situation. There is an upcoming safety seminar at WFHS on August 29th. Roger is looking into a camera security system for our church. Talked about the creation of a mission statement.

Trustees: Continuing to work on projects as they come up.

Board of Education: Daycare budget is doing ok. Staff will attend safety seminar at WFHS on the 29th. The daycare will be closed that day. Information was given regarding the Concordia plan. The film fest was another great event. About 40 people attended. National Youth Gathering is coming up next year in Minneapolis. If a group is interested in going they need to start the process now. The Way will continue to meet on Sunday mornings. Sunday school enrollment is ongoing. The first Sunday of Sunday school will be a kickoff event. Confirmation starts September 12th.

Old Business:

New Business:

Website: We are still waiting for our website to be upgraded to a mobile platform. This has been an ongoing concern as we signed up to move to this platform almost 3 years ago. Calls/emails are vague as to the timeline. A new website company (faithconnectors.com) was submitted for us to review. They have a mobile platform that we are looking for. Pricing sheets were passed around. It was suggested that council members look at the various web layouts on their web page. It was agreed to table this until the September meeting so that members could view the different offerings.

Stop the bleed: Sandy will be having this training program come into the daycare to do training for the staff. Date to be determined, members of council would be invited.

Carpet Cleaning: Daycare is having carpets cleaned on Wednesday August 29th. If people could come about 4:00 pm on Tuesday to help move stuff out of the daycare areas that would be appreciated. They could also use help about 7:00 am on Thursday morning to move stuff back into those areas.

Community Foundation: The Community Foundation will have a grant writing training session on September 14th. Sandy will be attending and has invited other council members to also attend.

Church Facility Use: Holly Schrieber has requested to use the fellowship hall at the end of September for a baby shower. Motion by Bobbi Marks, seconded by Phil Lewin to approve. Motion carried.

Invoice and Free will offering from Service in the Park: It was recommended that the \$808.00 from the free will offering be placed in the general fund and that the \$200.00 invoice from that event then be paid from the general fund. Motion by Bobbi Marks, seconded by Phil Lewin to approve. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Bobbi Marks, seconded by Mark Peters to adjourn. We adjourned at 7:20 pm.


