A Lesson In Rescue

As of this writing, the full effects of Hurricane Harvey are becoming known. We can only begin to comprehend the immensity and aftermath of this event in Houston through the eyes of individuals, in the stories of heartache, hope and heroism, as they emerge. One such story is of a pastor living north of Houston who got together a caravan of trailered fishing boats and pick-ups to help with the rescue of the evacuees. As the group stopped to refuel at a gas station; one man asked them where they were headed. "To Houston," one of the group replied, "to help with the rescue." Without hesitation, the man with the question, grabbed his wallet and peeled off three one-hundred dollar bills. "Here," he said, "take this! Texans stick with Texans."

I'm sure in days to come this will be one of many stories repeated again and again. But why does it take a disaster or tough events for people to remember what matters and what counts in life? The help, the real help that counts doesn't come from an institution or government agency thousands of miles away but from your neighbor or member of your community you are in. What people discover in the process is the power, the compassion and the concern of their fellow human beings. In the end, it isn't the things that matter. It's the people who count!

The events of Hurricane Harvey and its aftermath are a reminder that we, as God's people are in a rescue operation. A lot of times we don't see ourselves in that kind of role. Yet people around us

have their own personal hurricanes blowing apart life and flooding what they thought was solid and stable. Maybe you can recall your own circumstances when that was so. Wasn't it good that there was *somebody* there? *Someone* who took the time and the effort to help? When we look back and wonder how we ever got through it... then we remember: *Someone* was there. A fellow Christian assuring us through word and actions that Christ is still there for us!

Paul's words to the Corinthians remind us that Christians are in the business of receiving and giving. Our life together in Christ means that we receive strength and power that God provides us in Christ in Word and Sacraments. That happens and can only happen through worship and time hearing/reading Christ's Word and Promises. That steady diet of Christ's love and power gives us power to meet the challenges not only in our life but in the lives of others. Let somebody else do it, isn't any kind of solution. Somebody isn't the other guy who you imagine or think should be doing his/her part. Christ teaches us that this Somebody is you!

September is the start of the Fall/Winter Schedule. Instead of paging through the newsletter distracted or disinterested – look for way you can plug yourself into the activities, organizations and needs that are ongoing in our congregation. If you wonder, does my presence or effort really matter... let me leave you with a final thought. One of the big movies this past summer was Dunkirk. It is the true story of a dramatic rescue of tens of thousands of soldiers stranded on the beach at Normandy during WW II. Through the heroic efforts of hundreds of everyday people from England a mighty fleet of a rag-tag fishing boats, yachts, and trawlers saved the day and countless lives. It is one of the great untold stories of WW II for a world that has forgotten and far too often gets caught up in the idolatry of oneself. Opportunities to be that somebody for somebody else are all around us if we open our eyes to them. See yourself in rescue mode. Great things will happen when we live for other instead of ourselves as Christ lived, died and rose again for us!



New Year of Catechism Class 2017-18

Catechism Class for the Fall & Winter term will begin on Wednesday, September 13, 2017 at 6:30 PM. This class is for all 6th, 7th and 8th grade children of our congregation in preparation for Examination and Confirmation in the Christian faith. This first class, parents are asked to accompany their students for the first session beginning at 6:30 PM. Information and registration (\$25.00 to cover the cost of workbooks and materials) will be taken care of that evening. Catechism Class is a three year program of Catechism lessons, assignments, Bible history and memorizations of portions of Luther's Catechism. Catechism Class lasts from 6:30-8 PM. Full-time Teachers this year are Pastor and Sarah Pope. Like last year, parents are asked to take a turn each Wednesday class period to help with memory work. Currently we have 16 students for Catechism instruction.





Adult Bible Classes for '17-'18

Sunday Morning Bible Class kicks off for the Fall on Sunday, September 17th at 9:30 AM with a special presentation, "A Man Named Martin – Part 3: The Movement" This is the third installment of a 3 year study series designed to honor the life & times of the German Reformer, his unparalleled contributions to the Christian Church & the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation on October 31, 2017. It's a fascinating study! Please come! After this study is concluded we will continue our study of Route 66 (66 books of the Bible) as we conclude the Old Testament with the last book: Malachi. The book of Malachi addresses issues remarkably similar to the problems that God's people & His Church are facing today. Then we will begin our study on the 4 Gospels in the New Testament. Please come & be a part of the group & the lively discussions. Part of the Sunday Morning Bible Class Kick Off will include special drawings for the Reformation Summer Bible **Reading Challenge!**

Wednesday Morning Bible Class continues during the month of September at 10:30AM. This Bible Class began a study of the Book of

Acts in June of 2017. We are half way through the book of Acts. Even if you have missed most of the book of Acts, each chapter of the Book of Acts shows us how the Word of the Lord grows even under the most trying and difficult of circumstances. The Book of Acts written by Luke, reads like a travelogue as we follow Paul on his missionary journeys. The words of Jesus to His disciples that they would be His witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria and to the ends of the earth; unfolded in the first century A.D. After we conclude our study of the Book of Acts, we want to continue in a study of Church History as we read through a book by Roland Bainton, entitled: "The Church of Our Fathers". This short book provides a wonderful summary of the history of the Church from the apostolic age to the end of the 19th Century. The book is written in a lively, engaging and uncomplicated style filled with illustrations. This is a good study to have during this Anniversary Year of the Lutheran Reformation. Come and join us. The ICF is a Christian humanitarian organization that was formed in Neenah, Wisconsin over 40 years ago. It began as one man's mission to help children around the world and is unique in its work because there is no bureaucracy, just dedicated people who are committed to making a difference in the lives of those who need it most. At the moment the work of this organization is to provide needed supplies for families and children in West Africa. And best of all, it is easy to participate in. This is called a "Shoe-Box Ministry" and provides Christmas joy to African Christians who are being persecuted for the faith through Muslim insurgency. ICF works through a network of Christian African pastors to help with this Christmas distribution. All that this involves is taking a simple shoe box and filling it with items for either a boy or girl or family. Write on the top of the shoe box cover if it is for a boy/girl/family and put the cover on the box. A Christmas card or note of Christian encouragement can also be included. Items that are appreciated are school supplies, hygiene items as well as miscellaneous items (t-shirts, socks, hard candy). Boxes (unsealed) need to be brought to church by October 15, 2017 so that they can be delivered to the office in Neenah. Best of all, these shoe boxes will be shipped and delivered free of charge. ICF partners with container ships that have room in their vessels for this humanitarian work. This is a wonderful opportunity to spread the Gospel of Christ with our notes of encouragement and gifts to people who will gladly receive it. ICF's headquarters are; PO Box 583, Neenah, Wisconsin. They have a website www.icfaid.org. Very shortly, there will be a display and example explaining this opportunity as well as a presentation in the near future.
